Course Description

Human health is inextricably linked to the health of the earth's natural systems, which determine the air we breathe, the food we can grow, the spread of disease and much more. Many natural systems are now disrupted as a result of human activities, including the delivery of healthcare. The understanding of these two sets of relationships is called planetary health.

This interactive 8-hour course is designed for those working in health and social care including clinicians, public health and healthcare facilities management. It is conducted in two parts.

The first part explores the how our understanding of planetary health will affect health system in the coming decade, and highlights examples of good practice in sustainable healthcare based on four principles:

- 1. Prevention: promoting health by tackling the causes of illnesses and inequalities
- 2. Patient self-care: empowering patients to take a greater role in managing their health
- 3. Lean service delivery: streamlining care systems to minimise wasteful activities
- 4. Low carbon alternatives: prioritising treatments & technologies with a lower environmental impact

The second part uses intensive, small-group exercises to plan activities in your setting, with guidance from CSH instructors and your inter-professional peers (see programme outline below).

- Apply the principles of sustainable development to the health sector
- Identify effective cases of sustainable practice in clinical care and facilities management

Part I. Preparation

CSH is an independent charity leading efforts to incorporate the values of environmental sustainability into the health sector since 2008.

The Centre's pioneering Sustainable Specialties programme fosters change within existing clinical communities, supported by research into the carbon footprint of alternative technologies and models of care. The specialty-led approach is complemented by tools designed to empower clinicians, including <u>SAP</u> (Sustainable Action Planning for clinical teams), online clinical <u>Networks</u> and the Green Ward Competition.

CSH hosts the Sustainable Healthcare Education (SHE) network, which supports the integration of sustainability into health professional education. In 2012-13, the SHE network coordinated a national consultation on <u>priority learning outcomes for sustainability</u> which informed the revision of (and are referenced from) the General Medical Council's "Outcomes for graduates 2018". CSH runs sustainability scholarship and fellowship programmes for practising clinicians and provides sustainable healthcare training in a range of formats.

CSH has pioneered the integration of sustainability into quality improvement and has developed the SusQI framework^{1,2,3} to integrate sustainability into quality improvement methodology. It has been at the forefront of developing training and supporting sustainable QI projects.
